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Management of the Islamic Centre

The Islamic Centre is one of the biggest Muslim organisations in the city responsible for 2 Mosques (Leicester Mosque, Sutherland Street, and the Leicester Central Mosque, Conduit Street), a Madrassa for over 225 children, community and sporting facilities and burial services.

To support and extend these services we have a main management council of the Islamic Centre and a number of sub committees.

Management Council

The members of management council of the Islamic Centre have dedicated themselves to running the two mosques, community facilities and all the services provided under the spiritual guidance of Allama Shahid Raza and the leadership of Malik Salim. The Management Council is 29 members strong and oversees all work and services carried out at the Islamic Centre.

Financial Sub-Committee

The General Secretary, Marawat Hussain along with Bashir Ahmed (Treasurer), ZA Malik, the Chairman Malik Salim and the Vice Chairman Harun Jussab oversee all financial matters associated with the Islamic Centre.

Education Sub-Committee

The education sub committee is responsible for the Madrassa which runs from four sites: The Leicester Mosque (Sutherland St), the Leicester Central Mosque (Conduit Street), Uplands Primary school and Highfields Primary school. The Madrassa provides religious education for over 225 children and is managed by the Education Secretary Abdullah Patel, his assistant Mustafa Khatri and the education sub-committee members.

Youth Sub-Committee

The Islamic Centre has mobilised our youth to form the youth sub-committee and takes responsibility for providing services geared toward the new generation of Muslims. The Youth Sub-Committee Secretary is Mohammed Ayub.

Maintenance Sub-Committee

The Maintenance sub-committee consisting of Vice Chairman Harun Jussab, Chairman Malik Salim, Mohammed Hafeez and Hanif Girach who take responsibility for the day to day maintenance and repair of the two mosques and all the facilities ran by the Islamic Centre.

Construction Sub-Committee

Major structural and construction projects and major repairs are overseen by Malik Salim, Harun Jassab, Mohammed Hafeez, Mohammed Hussain Khan, Sheikh Sarwar, AW Bajwa and Maqsood Ahmed.

Funeral Sub-Committee

Salahaddin Chughtai (Funeral Secretary) has the responsibility for the mortuary and all burial arrangements. This year the sub-committee has dealt with 48 funerals including 3 sent abroad. Sister Raihana Girach and Sister Kulsum Amin have been a great help with the arrangements for the Ghusal of women who have passed away.

Niaz Sub-Committee

All Niaz for the major religious gatherings held throughout the year, the weekly Khatams on Thursdays and the iftari arrangement in Ramadhan are managed by Skeikh Nawaz (Niaz Secretary), Khushnood Ahmed, Ahmed Fojdar, Hamid Khan and Younas Ahmad.

A special thanks to Wali Bhai and his family and relatives who made a significant contribution to the Niaz on the occasion of Eid Milad-un-Nabi.

Women's Sub-Committee

The Islamic Centre Women's Association (ICWA) is managed by Midat Batool (ICWA Secretary), Sabiha Ahmed, Jamila Harun, Raihana Girach and Shamim Jamil.

Website Sub-Committee

The IT infrastructure and Islamic Centre Website is managed by Yassir Hussain and Imran Mughal.

Interfaith / Liaison Sub-Committee

Sheikh Sarwar leads our interfaith and inter-community activities. This sub-committee is responsibility for leading the lectures and workshops given to the school groups which visit the mosque (on average once a week) as well as the other groups which visit our mosque. These include Magistrates, Councillors, MP's and other faith leaders.

Administrator and Press/Media Officer

GM Malik takes responsibility for general administration in the office as well as being the press and media officer for the Islamic Centre.

Construction (Capital) Costs

A significant costs is associated with the general maintenance and upkeep of the Leicester Central Mosque and Leicester Mosque, Imams residents, Mortuary and Community/Sports. Current expenditure to keep all this running far exceeds any money coming in from donations and Islamic Centre services (such as the Community Hall).

Imam Flat - 1st Floor

The first floor flat at 50 St. Peters Road has remained empty for a number of years. As part of the general maintenance programme the flat was renovated. The work included structural alterations, decorating, carpets and a new kitchen.

Leicester Mosque

A major programme of renovation was carried out at the Leicester Mosque (Sutherland St) this year which included the Wuzu area being painted and re-tiled as well as the external walls of the Mosque receiving a new coat of paint.

General (Running) Costs

General Maintenance

There is significant cost associated with the maintenance and upkeep of the two mosques and all the facilities. Many of these are to ensure the Islamic Centre meets legal and health and safety standards. On average £15,000 a year is spent on lift maintenance, security and alarm servicing, smoke and fire detection systems and all the electrics.

Running Costs

On average £2,000 a week is used on wages, building and liability insurance, rates and water rates, telephone, office administration, gas and electricity bills and many other cost associated with running all the facilities and services provided by the Islamic Centre.

Donation Levels

Like the rest of the world, the Mosque has had a significant increase in the cost associated with running it. The gas and electric bills alone have doubled in the last 12 months but the donation levels by our Brothers and Sisters remain the same. The Islamic Centre can not function without an increase in your support and donations. Please give generously.

Community Hall and Function Rooms

There is a common misconception that the revenue generated from the community hall and function rooms is sufficient to run all the services of the Islamic Centre. The reality is that revenue generated is used for the actual maintenance and running of the community hall and function rooms themselves. Insurance, fire regulations, health and safety rules, access, heating, electrics, cleaning and upkeep costs need to be paid and a significant proportion of revenue generated is used on this.

You can help by making the Leicester Central Mosque community hall and function rooms your first choice when booking facilities. The main hall can hold 600 people with the downstairs rooms holding 300 and 150 people. Contact khushnood Ahmed to book.

Gift Aid

The Islamic Centre is able to take advantage of the governments Gift Aid scheme with your donations. For every pound you give, the Islamic Centre has claimed an additional 25 pence from the government. The only condition is that you are a UK tax payer. This is a practice used by all charities. As you can imagine this generates a significant amount of additional money for the Mosque from your donations. Please ensure your donations are processed by a member of the management council of the Islamic Centre and you receive a receipt.

News, Services and Events

Head Imam Honoured

Maulana Shahid Raza was honoured with an OBE in the Queen's New Year Honours List this year for his services to the Muslim Community. It is a great honour for us all that our head imam was the first ever to be recognise in this way.

To celebrate this unique achievement, a dinner was held in June 2008 organised by his friends and supported by management council of the Islamic Centre and PYCA.

Chairman Honoured

Malik Salim was made an honourary Alderman of the city of Leicester. He is the first Asian to receive such an honour and recognises his hard work over the years in serving the city and its people.

New Alim Joins Islamic Centre

Moulana Mufti Shakir Patel Misbahi has joined the Islamic Centre from India (educated in South Africa). He has taken on the role of head teacher at the Madrassa as well as deputising for Maulana Shahid Raza. He is a valuable new resource to the Islamic Centre and the management council on behalf of the community extends their welcome to him.

Better Access and Extra Car Parking

The sheer size of the Leicester Central Mosque, the number of people who can pray and use the facilities (such as the community hall) has resulted in one major problem: parking. It has become clear that without additional parking facilities it will become increasingly difficult to expand and support the services and facilities provided.

The management council of the Islamic Centre has been using all its resources to persuade Leicester City Council to sell the piece of land opposite the Mosque on Conduit Street to the Islamic Centre to extend our car parking facilities. There has been some progress and once the City Council agrees, the main task will be raising the funds to pay for the land. We have, with your support, developed this project so far and hope that your support and co-operation will continue.

With previous local administration it has been near impossible to lobby support for the Islamic Centre. With the 2007 City Council elections, came a change in administration. It has become much easier to deal with the current councilors who show a greater understanding for our needs and are more sympathetic.

Home Secretary's Visit

Home Secretary Jacqui Smith visited the Leicester Central Mosque in February 2008 to meet with members of the Muslim community, including members of the Mosque's management council, the Women's association (ICWA) and young people involved in some of the Mosque's activities.

The Home Secretary spent time talking to groups of young people about the work they do with the Mosque, as well as issues such as community cohesion, their careers and experiences as young Muslims today and challenges for the future.

The Home Secretary was taken on a tour of the mosque and its facilities and was impressed with what the Muslims of Leicester had achieved.

Home Secretary Jacqui Smith said:

"I am very proud in my role as Home Secretary to represent all of our British communities and promote and protect the shared values that we have in this country. My visit to Leicester Central Mosque today is a chance to meet with members of the Muslim community and discuss issues of importance here and recognise our shared values.

"The British Muslim community has an integral part to play in our communities and in our country. And protecting that contribution to our country and the lives and well being of the Muslim community is an important part of my role as Home Secretary."

MINAB Consultation Event

The Mosques and Imams National Advisory Board (MINAB) held its regional consultation event at the Leicester Central Mosque in February 2008.

Over 120 representatives from Islamic organisations and mosque attended this first stage of national consultation which is designed to obtain views on issues such as the accreditation of Imams, better governance of Mosques and interfaith activity. The information gained will be used to develop and disseminate a good practice guide, setting out the principles and procedures that Mosques and Imams should follow to effectively lead their communities.

Free Legal Consultation Service

Zafar Rafiq, a practicing lawyer for 15 years and partner of the national law firm Cobbetts, is now offering his extensive legal knowledge to the Muslim Community with this free legal consultation service held every Tuesday at the Leicester Central Mosque.

Due to high demand this service works on a strict advance booking basis. Further information on how to book is available on the mosque notice board.

Eid Milad-un-Nabi Celebrations

Despite the attempts by some gutless and faceless people to upset the Mawlid celebrations with a poster campaign, thousands of Muslims turned out for the Eid Milad-un-Nabi celebrations and procession.

Due to changes in the law, this year marked the first time the Islamic Centre took responsibility for the traffic management of the procession. Thanks to the hard work of all involved, the procession was completed without incident. The police were so impressed by the management and running of the procession, key organisers and team leaders were hounoured by the police with the Apex award. The methods created by the Islamic Centre for the management of such events is now recognised by the Police as the 'method of best practice' and are recommended to all other organisation planning processions.

Nur of the Prophet Lecture

Maulana Hafiz Ather Hussain al-Azhari held a special multimedia presentation as part of the Eid Milad-un-Nabi celebrations exploring the evidence supporting the Prophet of Nur. A copy of the presentation is available on the Mosque website.

Ghosia Khatams

The Islamic Centre has introduced Ghosia Khatams on or around the 11th day of each Islamic month. Separate Khatams are organised for our Muslim Brothers and Sisters which sees many people attending. The date of each khatam is announced in advance and information is displayed on the notice boards.

Continued Commitment to Religious Education

Allama Shahid Raza leads Juma prayers, offers a Dars-e-Quran each Sunday and leads all the major religious events and gathering held by the Islamic Centre.

Qari Zawar Bhadur joins us each Ramadhan to lead Travih prayers at the Leicester Central Mosque as well offering religious lectures at both mosques.

A weekly Dars-e-Hadith programme is held in English at the Leicester Mosque (Sutherland St) every Saturday evening. Maulana Hafiz Ather Hussain al-Azhari presents this short but informative insight into words of our beloved Prophet (Peace be upon him)

School of Cultural and Linguistic Studies

The School of Cultural and Linguistic Studies under the management of Yusaf Aboobakar and with the full support of the management council of the Islamic Centre now runs classes at the Leicester Central Mosque.

Each weekday evening, young Muslims are offered GSCE classes in Arabic and Islamic Studies.

English Heritage Open Day

Recently, an open day was held at the mosque as part of the English Heritage program. The Leicester Central Mosque is the only Mosque in the City to be included in the English Heritage List. This attracted a good volume of visitors, who were very impressed both with the facilities and services offered by the mosque. The Management are actively involved in building and promoting general awareness within the wider community, which helps to give a better understanding of the values and principles of being a Muslim

Mashallah, the construction of the mosque and its complex has been undertaken by the Muslims of Leicester for the people of Leicester. Today, Leicester Central Mosque is a prominent landmark within the city of Leicester. We should feel proud of our Masjid Complex and may Allah Tala reward those who have dedicated their time and resources, in order to make all this possible.

Youth Group Update

Men's Badminton Tournament

November 2007 marked the first men's doubles Badminton tournament to be held at the Leicester Central Mosque Sports Halls. Regular attendees to the badminton sessions (on Tuesdays and Thursdays), along with other members of the Muslim community, came together to create 16 teams. A very competitive day resulted in Sajid and Raja Toni winning gold, Imran and Wakar winning silver and bronze went to Shahid and Tourig.

Milad Workshop

Over the past year various Itekaaf/Workshops have been held. These have been tailored to the needs of the children. The Islamic Centre on an on-going basis looks at ways of improving the method of delivering educational material, using many modern teaching techniques available. This enables us to make the sessions interesting and to convey the message across in an effective manner. Practical sessions complement the seminars and speeches.

Our programs are designed to promote the following topics:

Manners, Moral Standards, Respect for Parents/Teachers, General behavior, Environment, Recycling etc etc. Within the workshops we have quizzes and competitions, for which prizes are given to winners.

Children are encouraged to participate in Naat competitions and Islamic Art. Light meals and snacks are provided for refreshments.

Support main activities

Madrassa Update

Learning and Dedication

The Islamic Centre Madrassa is a well established Islamic school for education and learning, and is attended by over 225 students aged between 4 and 13 on a daily basis. The Madrassa has nine classes across four locations in Highfields, Leicester. The Madrassa students who come from a diverse range of local cultures are able to learn a broad mix of subjects including Arabic, Tajweed and Islamic History. The students, teachers and administration staff continuingly require the assistance of volunteers who can assist the operations of the Madrassa in a number of ways.

New Head Teacher

The Islamic Centre recently welcomed a new Head Teacher to join the Madrassa. Maulana Mufti Shakir Patel is a young Alim who has studied extensively at Islamic Schools of Knowledge across India and South Africa. Since his arrival at the Madrassa, Maulana Shakir has made a significant contribution to the children and overall Madrassa activities. Maulana Shakir undertakes weekly class assemblies in English covering a wide range of subjects including Tajweed, Aqeeda and Fiqh. Children have found these assemblies to be particularly beneficial and enjoyable.

Hifz Class

After Ramadhan, a Hifz-ul-Qur'an class for boys will be restarted at the Leicester Central Mosque site. The Islamic Centre Madrassa has a long history of producing students who complete their Hifz-ul-Qur'an prior to leaving the Madrassa, and it is therefore important that this tradition and achievement maintained by students of the past continues into the future. Parents are invited and encouraged to enroll their children for this class. For enrolment or for any further queries on the Hifz class, please contact Abdullah Patel (Education Secretary) or any member of the Madrassa administration team.

Islamic History Assemblies

As in the prior year, Brother Farhaan Patel who is a former student of the Madrassa and now a teacher at a local primary school has continued to undertake weekly assemblies to the children at the Sutherland St site.

The assemblies which take place on Fridays' provide the students with a detailed understanding of their Islamic heritage. Over the last year, topics covered have included:

- The Life of Shaykh Abdal Qadir Jilani (may Allah be pleased with him)
- Isra wa Mir'aj- The Night journey of our beloved Prophet (peace and blessings be upon him)
- Laylaytul Baarat- The blessed night in mid-Sha'ban
- The importance of fasting- refraining from food and ennobling character

The students particularly enjoy these sessions and it allows them to learn about Islam in interesting ways using English as the medium. Weekly homework is set for all participants which reinforces learning objectives.

Target Sheets

After Ramadhan last year, each individual student received a target sheet according to their age. The target sheet allows the student to monitor his or her progress against what is generally expected from their age group. The target sheets are also very useful for parents to closely monitor

and actively get involved in their child's progress. Parents are encouraged to regularly monitor their child's progress by referring to the target sheet. Any queries or concerns should be raised with the Education Secretary or the class teacher.

Examinations and Parents Evening

The Madrassa annual examinations will be taking place in November 2008 followed by a prize and certificate giving ceremony at the Students Jalsa. Parents should encourage their children to begin their revision during Ramadhan to ensure they achieve their full potential during the examinations.

Before the examination period, a parents evening will be held to discuss their child's progress with the child's teacher and other members of the Madrassa administration team. Parents should take this opportunity to raise any queries about their child's Madrassa education and performance.

Note to Parents

Student Attendance

Although the Madrassa is attended by over 225 children, attendance at the Madrassa at times is not to a satisfactory level, particularly during the school holidays. Absent children miss out on a significant amount of knowledge, particularly the assemblies by Maulana Shakir and Brother Farhaan Patel. Further, students who are absent run the risk of falling behind against their peers and parents are therefore requested to ensure their children are present at Madrassa throughout the year, particularly during the school holidays so that they receive the full benefit if Madrassa activities.

Student Participation

A number of activities are also organised for the Madrassa children by the Islamic Centre Youth Group e.g. Ramadhan Itikaaf. Children are encouraged to enroll for these unique events as a supplement to their Madrassa education.

Student appearance

Parents are requested to ensure their children are aware of the Islamic requirements and obligations regarding keeping ones body and clothes clean. Parents must ensure that students arrive to Madrassa with wudhu (ablution), a clean uniform (and socks), and an overall tidy presentation.

Niaz Distribution in Madrassa

Only home made items with halal ingredients, items from Muslim bakeries, and fruits packed in small bags will be allowed for distribution as Niaz for Madrassa children

Message of Thanks and Volunteer Appeal

The Islamic Centre would like to thank all the teaching staff and volunteers for their dedicated efforts over the past year particularly Brother Mustafa Khatri, Brother Farhaan Patel, Brother Ashraf Rahil, Brother Muhammad Ayub, Sister Sabrina Aziz, Haji Jamal Suleman, Brother Nisar Arkate, Dr Zeerak Attari and Yahya Bhai Ghumra.

The current volunteer base at the Madrassa is small in relation to the numbers that are required to ensure that the students receive a more desired level of support. The Education Secretary and the Education Administrator require the assistance of more English speaking volunteers to assist them with support activities such as mentoring students, assisting students with homework, assisting teachers by giving assemblies on Islamic topics, ensuring all absenteeism is accounted for, and many more.

Parents and former students of the Madrassa are particularly requested to take an interest. Over 30 children can forward to compete in a naat competition. Encouraged by the sisters attending, the children recited naats and nasheeds with full devotion. Refreshments were served to all guests. ICWA will soon be holding another competition for the young.

Creative Textiles Course

ICWA organised a creative textile course in collaboration with the Adult Education College. This six week course was attended by many of our sisters who expanded their creative skills using a range of different materials and textile techniques.

Fund Raising Dinner

A fund raising dinner was organized by ICWA in March of this year. As well as a delicious meal, our sisters enjoyed competitions and Mendhi sessions. The event raised a substantial amount for the Islamic Centre. Many thanks to all our sisters who worked so hard to make this event a success.
